On Friday, 31 January, the Kerang Presbyterian Church was filled with activity. Rev Miles Fagan was appointed to the Parish of Northern Lakes. Miles, together with his wife Robyn and two teenage children, Rebecca and Joel, recently moved from Noorat, just north of Terang in South West Victoria.

The Northern Lakes Parish was formed in October 2013 by the Presbytery of North Western Victoria to combine the three congregations from Pyramid Hill, Kerang and Swan Hill, which had experienced extended vacancies and which were seen to be more viable if combined.

The Moderator of the Presbytery, Rev Philip Burns, conducted the service and preached a rousing sermon from 2 Kings 2. Also in attendance were several ministerial colleagues from around Victoria and interstate: the Presbyterian Church of Victoria State Moderator, Rev David Palmer and his wife, Chris; members of the Fagan's previous parish of Noorat; and local Kerang clergy. It is also a wonderful blessing to already have contact with Gisborne as I worked alongside them as a Home Missionary and was also placed with them in my final year of study. The church family at Gisborne Pressy have been an amazing encouragement to our family and we are excited about working together with them to make Christ known to the community of Gisborne and beyond.

PWMU launches new cookbook

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
Cookbook Committee were recognized at the launch, in particular those of the editor, Dr Mairi Harman, who acknowledged the help she had received from her fellow Committee members and also her husband, Rev Prof Alan

At the conclusion of the very enjoyable morning, Mrs Chernov and Dr Harman were presented with flowers. The morning tea that was enjoyed included some items cooked from recipes in the book. Most attendees took the opportunity to purchase copies of the PWMU Cookbook and also From Suet to Saffron by Fiona Bligh, which is a history of the Cookbook.

The cookbook was first published in 1904 and was a runaway success, bringing in a steady income that PWMU used for mission work. Since union in 1977, the cookbook has been overseen by a joint committee, which consists of members of the Presbyterian and Uniting Churches. The royalties generated by the sales of the cookbook are divided equally between PWMU and Uniting Church Adult Fellowship.

Since that time PWMU's profits from the cookbook have been deposited in a Bursary Fund that is used to enable students from developing countries to study at the PTC in Melbourne. This is a joint venture between PWMU, TEC and APWM Vic, with the PWMU Bursary providing the student with accommodation, health care, transport and a living allowance while they are in Melbourne. Many men have benefitted from having had this opportunity, returning to their homes to continue gospel work better equipped for the task. Thanks be to God for having used the cookbook to such good purpose and we pray that this will continue.



Women's Ministry Victoria

I wonder if you can name those women who have had a positive influence in your life. Perhaps these are women who loved and cared for you, who showed you what it meant to live sacrificially and serve God willingly.

Maybe they listened to you when you needed to be heard, forgave you when you needed to know forgiveness, or spoke the truth to you when it needed to be spoken—even if you may not have appreciated it at the time. As I write, I can think of some women in my life who fit that bill. All of these women loved God, applied the word of God to their lives, and showed me grace when I least deserved it.

When I think about what Women's Ministries can be, these women physically illustrate the definition. Why? Because as women they lived out and taught the grace, truth and love of God in the ways God, by his grace, had given them to do. They were not perfect or consumed with lofty thoughts of themselves, and they did not live fairytale lives. They took God and his word seriously, and have left a lasting impression on my life.

And where did I find them? In my local church. These women were important in my local church because as women they lived out the practical implications of what we heard being faithfully preached by our minister (a godly male seeking to glorify God) Sunday after Sunday. They were women who did not just hear the word, but did what it said. I know the difference it made to me. I saw how it impacted them and all those around them.

So is Women's Ministry important? Yes! But why? The book *Women's Ministry in the Local Church* (pgs 36-38) by J Ligon Duncan and Susan Hunt gives us some important reasons.

- We need to teach what the Bible teaches about womanhood, ie: How are we related to God? How does Scripture define womanhood? How are we related to others?
- We need to disciple godly, feminine Christian women.
- We need to promote healthy, godly Christian marriages.
 - · We need to cultivate among our

Christian women a joyous embrace of godly, healthy, Christian male spiritual leadership in the church.


 We need to help Christian women appreciate the manifold areas of service that are open to them in the church and to equip them distinctively as women to fulfil their ministry.
